#### **CHAIRMAN'S CHAT - MAY 2007**

Welcome to the latest 'Chairman's Chat'.

This issue's interesting item comes from my collection of the Orange Free State Postal Stationery. This is an item that I was very pleased to acquire recently after 20 years of searching!

Although postal cards were introduced in the OFS in early 1884, it was not until 1892 that there was an

overseas postcard rate introduced. In the intervening period, the only way that a postcard could be sent overseas was at the letter rate. Clearly, this was rarely done, because if a writer was to be charged the letter rate, they would take the advantage of writing a full letter, rather than a short note on the reverse of a postal card.



The card that I have acquired was sent in 1887 to Germany at the then letter rate of  $7^{1}/_{2}d$ . The postage being made up using 6d and  $^{1}/_{2}d$  adhesive stamps in addition to the 1d Orange postal card. The card was used from Bloemfontein where it received three beautiful strikes in red of the 11-bar number 1 numeral cancel. The card also has the large  $2^{1}/_{2}d$  accountancy mark, also in red (as usual), applied at Cape Town indicating the payment due to the British Post Office.

During 1892, the postcard rates were introduced at 1d to the UK and  $1^{1}/_{2}d$  to other destinations.

I plan to attend both **Swinpex** on the 9th of June and **Midpex** on the 30th of June and hope to meet as many members as possible at these events. I would strongly encourage all members to attend these excellent events. Full details can be found in the 'Society Calendar' section of this journal (on p2. opposite).

#### REPORT OF THE SOCIETY'S MARCH MEETING

The Society's first meeting this year was held at the BPT (British Philatelic Trust) Headquarters in London on Saturday 17th March, with our new chairman, Mike Smith, keeping everyone in order. This was the last time that it was possible to hold a meeting at this location as the BPT have now sold the building to make more money available for philately. Thirteen members were present, with John Jennison travelling all the way from Switzerland to be with us.

Apologies were given by Arturo Martin de Nicolas and Keith Hanman. Minutes of the previous meeting in October, including the report of the AGM, were accepted.

Members were reminded that meetings would take place at Swinpex on 9th June, in the new school building behind the old building, where Swinpex has been held in the past, and at Midpex where the society will have a table to promote the benefits of becoming a member of our society.

A short discussion took place concerning the agenda for the meeting and auction to be held in October. The Royal Philatelic Society are considering whether it would be possible to allow private auctions to be conducted in their building, but until that decision is made it will only be possible to have those auction lots on display that are requested members, and we would have to conduct a postal only auction after the meeting. The auctioneer, Neil Sargent, will consider including illustrations of some lots within future auction catalogues, and possibly putting some images on the society's web site, providing the web site manager, Lars Engelbrecht, agrees.

Iain Stevenson gave the morning's display. He started with Belgian postcards from their introduction in January 1870 up to the 1930s, explaining how Belgium has had to cope with three languages, French, Flemish and German. He went on to tell us about the "not to be delivered on Sunday" cachets and how this was optional depending on you religious viewpoint. Iain also explained what effects the German occupation had on Belgian postcards and showed examples of overprinted cards.

Iain also displayed many examples of Publibel advertising postcards, and lettercards, Belgium having invented lettercards in 1882. Finally, Iain showed cross channel ferry cards where the ships faced in either direction depending whether you bought your card on the way to Belgium or to England.

In the second half of his display, Iain concentrated on French postcards from the Second World War period. During the "phoney war", up to June 1940, the postal system in France remained much the same as before. But from then on, France was split into five regions, with communications between each being either impossible or extremely difficult. Special cards were produced by the German authorities allowing very limited correspondence between some regions, with separate types for private or business use. Some cards were returned if the regulations were not followed exactly. Despite the difficulties of communicating, Iain showed one card sent by a French family in 1942 to a couple in England, inviting them to the wedding of their daughter. And it got through!

Iain showed how the quality of materials used to make postcards in this period deteriorated. He also explained how flongs (paper mashie copies) were used to transfer printing plates between the various regions.

In the vote of thanks, Mike Smith said that we had been lucky to see two exceptional displays accompanied by expert commentary that enhanced rather than duplicated the material on show.

Neil Sargent was presented with the Society's cup which he keeps for one year. Neil's entry is illustrated over the page. (p6)

#### AFTERNOON DISPLAY

Everyone at the meeting went for lunch at a nearby restaurant, where conversations ranged from philatelic matters to current affairs. On their return, members showed what they had brought along with them, starting with a display by George King on Post Office uprated stationery, including registered envelopes of 1920 and later, and 1940 lettercards, all having embossed or letterpress additional stamps. In other instances stationery was uprated with adhesive stamps before it was sold by local post offices.

Neil Sargent showed Queen Victoria STO envelopes, including sheets of specimen stamps.

Peter O'Keeffe showed newspaper wrappers from the start in 1870, finishing with a reply paid lettersheets in the QEII period.

Tony Lane put up an interesting display of modern German commemorative cards and envelopes covering the period 1948 to 1995.

Colin Baker also showed Queen Victoria newspaper wrappers, with both PO and STO issues.

Alan Huggins showed examples of all the known postal stationery when it was reduced in value in 1922. This included postcards and envelopes.

Mike Smith finished the afternoon with more newspaper wrappers from the Cape of Good Hope and Natal, many having added adhesives for foreign rate postage.

Mike Smith thanked everyone for coming along to the meeting and in particular to those who had shown material.

#### THE BRITISH POSTAL MUSEUM AND ARCHIVE

In their Spring Newsletter, the BPMA has an article on "Airgraph Material at the BPMA". This gives a short introduction to airgraphs followed by notes on some of the materials in the collection. These include: POST 102/5 The Origin and Life of the Airgraph Service, POST 33/6038 Airgraph Services, POST 33/6045 A History of the Airgraph Service and POST 117/194 L'Union Postale, Volume 71, 6 June 1946. The article contains a couple of illustrations including this one below "Send Airgraphs" poster POST 110/194.

Amongst some of the information in the archives are a series of files from 1932 with correspondence illuminating the lead-up to the instigation of the service. Other correspondence in the collection provides facts and figures for the whole of the history of the service including details of discussions between the US and British Post Office over allocation of the equipment to operate the service and how on some occasions this was diverted without authority to other countries or put to use by other administrations. This collection provides a fascinating resource for anyone interested in this area.

For those members who are interested in Airgraphs, Laurie Farrell wrote an article "The


#### **GB POSTAL STATIONERY NEWS**



Since the last issue of the PSS Journal a number of new items have been drawn to my attention, none were produced recently indeed one could be 120 years old.

The first of these, courtesy of Bill Pipe, is an O.H.M.S. newspaper wrapper for use by the Honourable Artillery Company which has been created by overprinting the Post Office ½d brown wrapper with four lines of instructions (WP16). This is only the second Official Newspaper Wrapper recorded and will be listed as W02.


John Jennison has again come up with unrecorded KGVI items and these are firstly a W.H. Smith compound wrapper with 1d carmine + ½d orange, the latter being placed underneath the 1d stamp because of there being insufficient space to the left-hand side.





The overprinted cancellation of the text 'PRINTED PAPER/ REDUCED RATE' is slightly surprising since wrappers with this text are known with 1951 1d blue stamp. This will be listed as WS43 in revised listing.

A few months ago Michael Goodman found a size d KGV1 1½d green embossed STO postcard but John surprised us at the last meeting by producing the equivalent size f card. These cards will be CS118 & CS119 in revised listing.






John also sends an illustration of a used piece of the QV STO ½d green wrapper with 1.10.70 and tells us that 'The Echo' was a halfpenny daily London evening newspaper which reported

extensively on the 'Ripper' murders.

Graham Barker reports a proxy letter sheet with a KGVI 1d carmine stamp to be used for the 1945 meeting AGM of Bryant & May limited.









Jerry Kasper has sent in an illustration of a KGVI 21/2d POW Air Mail Letter Sheet (AP5) without the printing on the front side. In spite of this the sender added 'Postage/Paid/21/2d' in manuscript as well as 'PRISONER OF WAR POST' etc. and it was accepted and sent to Germany. A truly amazing usage.

This item which has a KGV 1d adhesive added is addressed to Holland and thus pays the 11/2d foreign postcard rate. The triangle is at the bottom left which seems to be the norm for Manchester items cf. 2d STO envelopes for the Carborundum Co. and Robert Noblett.

Finally I illustrate an item that I have had for some time and which I am also of the opinion can be considered a revalued envelope even though it has a diamond rather than a triangular Inspector's mark. The two ½d embossed dies differ in colour and wear marks so presumably this envelope was up-rated to the 1d printed matter rate (it has an ungummed tuck-in flap) before being folded.



#### PEFINS THROUGH POSTAL STATIONERY ITEMS: Newspaper Wrappers – Part 1

Compiled by John Barker

Newspaper Wrappers form the largest group of postal stationery items which bear perfins (perforated initials) through their stamp impressions. As with the previous articles in this series, the information has been provided by **Rosemary Smith** who has conducted research with the aid of members of the Perfin Society and published her findings in the Perfin Society Bulletins.

Through these articles I not only wish to inform members of the use of perfins on (G.B.) postal stationery, but to seek help in identifying more precisely which items of stationery have had perfins through their stamp impressions. If any member can add to the information given in these articles I would be most obliged to hear from them. All such information will be acknowledged and will be shared with Rosemary Smith and the Perfin Society. For any newspaper wrapper which has a perfin listed in the table please let me know:

- 1) if you can identify the Huggins number of the postal stationery item
- 2) if you can identify the user where no identification is given
- 3) if the item is postmarked earlier or later than the range given

This information will help to fill in the gaps in these tables.

For items which have a perfin which is **not** given in the list please identify the postal stationery item as far as possible with its Huggins number, identification of the user if this is printed or embossed on the item, the date and place of use (if used) and, if possible, a photocopy or scan showing the holes of the perfin. This would help cataloguers identify the perfin.

Identities in brackets are from the Tomkins Catalogue as the actual postal stationery item described does not have the identification on it. Identities marked Ø are 'possible' identities and have not been confirmed. Sources of information 'PSB' are from the Perfin Society Bulletins.







#### **BOOK REVIEW**



#### The Postal Stationery of the Bechuanalands and Botswana by Peter Thy and John Inglefield-Watson

It is not often that we have a new book on any aspect of the philately of the Bechuanalands and Botswana, so this is indeed a special event for our Society members. This outstanding book on the postal stationery of these territories has been a long time in coming. These two foremost experts in the field of postal stationery of the Bechuanalands and Botswana have collected, researched and written about the subject for many years, and fortunately for the current and future collectors of such material, have written a wonderfully comprehensive book on the subject.

The book certainly has general appeal to all collectors of the philately of the Bechuanalands and Botswana, as well as collectors of general postal stationery. It shall also appeal to collectors of overprints, as many interesting overprints occurred during the territories evolutionary years in the colonial times. Southern Africa and other British Commonwealth collectors will also find much of interest in the book.

This hard-bound 192-page book is the result of these many years of research in existing collections, archives and other sources, and it has long been awaited by specialist collectors to fill a gap in existing literature. It is likely to become the standard Bechuanalands and Botswana stationery handbook for decades to come.

Following an overall introduction and a useful users' guide, the book is divided into seven chapters that describe in great detail the stamped and unstamped stationery of British Bechuanaland, Bechuanaland Protectorate and Botswana. The individual chapters that cover the postcards, newspaper wrappers, registration envelopes, aerogrammes and express envelopes each contain an extensively annotated catalogue of all stationery positively known to exist.

Other chapters cover "specimen" marked stationery and known essays and proofs.

The book is comprehensively illustrated and lists a remarkably large amount of issued stationery in excess of 200 different items, including major varieties, about 45 different "specimens" and 50 essays and proofs. Each listed item is given a "BBS number" and this new numbering system is cross-referenced to previously published listings. The BBS number is, of course, a Bechuanalands and Botswana Society number! There is also a pair of small boxes alongside each listing for collectors to tick and record their holdings or wants.

The Postal Stationery of the Bechuanalands and Botswana was published in 2004 by the British Philatelic Trust in conjunction with the Bechuanalands & Botswana Society. The Society has now assumed responsibility for distribution of the book, and wishes to make it available for a limited period at a special promotional price, coupled with an optional offer of free Society membership.

The book will be available at the Bechuanalands & Botswana Society Stand at MIDPEX on Saturday 30th June for £20.

Non-members in the US and Canada may purchase a copy for US \$45, plus postage and packing (\$25 by air mail and \$13 by surface mail) All purchasers will be given the option of a free one year membership of the Society (usually \$25) which will include issues of the magazine 'Runner Post' and the opportunity to participate in the Society's Postal Bid Sales. 

#### **Forces Airletter with Perforated Cross**

Illustrated is a an STO red on grey Forces Airletter imprinted with a 4d blue Wilding stamp (Huggins ASP 10).

Regulations prohibited the STO impression being printed over anything, so the stamp being over the printed box for the adhesive, is in the wrong place. Hence, I believe, the reason for the blue crayon mark through the stamp impression. I have several examples of the stamp in the wrong place on airletters, and have seen others with crayon.


The perforated cross through the address panel is made up of nine dots and measures 8mm. x 8mm. Can anyone provide any information on this item or explain the reason for the perforated cross?

#### Estimating Survival Rates - Your Views.

In Vol 14 No.4 John Courtis examined 'survival rates' of used GB newspaper wrappers. Following on from the comments in Vol 15 No.1, Gary Watson, of Prestige Philately, Australia writes:-

"I have just read George King's comments with regard to John Courtis's "research" into various Wrappers. I have to say that I agree with virtually every comment he makes. However, I cannot let one statement pass without a response.

George states "Statements like "rare" or "very scarce" in auction catalogues should be seen as just sales spin." This I think is too cynical. It's certainly true that most auction firms are clue-less about postal stationery. However, most of them offer so little in the way of postal stationery lots that it hardly matters.

Some firms however have significant experience over a long period of time in offering a wide array of stationery. As a collector and dealer in the field for the past 27 years, I have a very good "feel" for the rarity of most items in my bailiwick. Particularly during the 1980s, I offered more postal stationery at auction than any other firm in the English-speaking world.

At my company, Prestige Philately, at least where Australian and Pacific material is concerned, I am confident that our assessment of the rarity or otherwise of virtually every issue is quite accurate. If we state an item is "rare" or "underrated" or whatever, it is almost always an accurate statement.

Naturally everyone makes mistakes and on occasion we have fallen into the "trap" of hyping up an item that doesn't warrant such attention. But, based on collector feedback we have received, such instances are themselves quite rare.


My suggestion to your readers, therefore, is that auction statements regarding rarity etc should be assessed by reference to a firm's track record and experience. If the firm is not noted for offerings of postal stationery, their comments about rarity may lack credibility. However, where the auction house has been a significant player in the market, such statements should be considered seriously."

Along similar lines to those expressed by George King in his letter published in the previous issue of the Journal, there are a couple of items in the March/April issue of "Postal Stationery", the Journal of the United



#### Postal Stationery Insurance Cards - George King

Following the illustration of several cards in Journal No.22 page 14, and Journal No.38 page 19, I have found another two. The first is from The Norwich Union Fire Insurance Society Ltd. Machine stamped for 24 May 1958. This one has not been through the post. The instruction "Insert This End" seems to imply the purchaser had to insert the card back into the machine to validate.



The second, is from The Ocean Accident & Guarantee Corporation Limited and has a ½d orange imprinted below the 2½d value. The card is pinkish orange.



## QUERIES AND REPLIES OUERY -

John Forbes-Nixon writes - "Rowland Hill's (1795 - 1879) signature appears on the bottom left hand corner of this halfpenny green wrapper which has been addressed, in another hand, to Charles Brooke, Esq., FRS., locally used in the London district. This gentleman was president of the Royal Meteorological Society from 1865-66. The London cancel is of the London N. W. /2 and bears no date.



My query is what is the purpose of Rowland Hill's signature on this wrapper? Was it a proving use for the postmark or wrapper or just a habit that died hard from persons with previous postage privilege? It is a pity the date of use cannot be established!"

Peter O'Keeffe writes - "I recently came across what looks like a 'Stamped to Order' Newspaper Wrapper, with an imprinted Queen Victoria ½d brown 'stamp' postmarked with a London 'N' (Newspaper ?) handcancel dated 16 July 1900. This appears to be Huggins type WS4, issued in 1897 (?) presumably intended as size (b) but actually 297mm x 125mm, and having the top two corners cut off. Printed by De La Rue & Co. Ltd. on buff (or is it straw?)coloured paper.



However, this might be Huggins type WP17, Size (b) (300 x 127mm) a straw coloured, Post Office issue of 1898, as it has no instructions. How can I tell?

I am puzzled by the wording <u>SEASON TICKET APPLICATION</u>; were such application forms in the 1900's so large that they needed 'Newspaper' wrappers rather than envelopes? and what sort of ticket might these be used for?

In those days, did they have Railway Season Tickets? or maybe it might have been for a series of concerts or sporting events?"



#### **UPRATED G.B. STATIONERY**

George King

I have been looking through the bound copies of Post Office Circulars and Gazettes (replaced circulars from creation of Post Office from GPO in 1969) held in the British Library, and the British Postal Museum and Archive, actually looking for information about Reply Coupons, when I spotted the following.

#### "2 December 1981

#### Stamped Stationery

Tariff Change 1st February 1982

There is to be an increase in the minimum inland first and second class letter rates - to 15½p and 12½p respectively. There will also be an increase in the price of the stationery element and registration fees and the following changes to the present range of stamped stationery items.

- \* Air Letter forms will be referred to as 'Aerogrammes' following the tariff changes.
- \* Lettercards are to be withdrawn and a new stamped lettersheet will be introduced in February/March 1982. In the intervening period between this postal tariff increase and the introduction of the new lettersheet any remaining stocks of lettercards may be sold at pre-tariff prices plus the additional postal charges. Postmasters should uprate the postage at the time of sale i.e. by sticking a 1p and a ½p stamp on the first class lettercard and a 1p stamp on the second class lettercard.

If any item uprated from earlier tariff changes are still on hand they should be withdrawn, at close of business on 30th January, 1982 either for local destruction, or return to Postal Supplies Division, Security Stores Division, as surplus stock. Other stocks held at close of business on 30th January, 1982 will be dealt with as follows:

- (i) 11½p items (Envelopes Size 1 and 2) should be uprated by sticking a 1p stamp to the left of the existing stamp and 14p items by sticking a 1p and a ½p stamp to the left of the existing stamp.
- (ii) Registered envelopes (registration fee increased by 10p and postage by 1½p) should be uprated by sticking an 11½p stamp below the existing stamp.
- (iii) Aerogrammes (Ordinary) should be uprated by sticking a 4p stamp to the left of the existing stamp. Aerogrammes (Pictorial) should be uprated by sticking a 4p stamp to the left of the existing stamp.

There are many similar notices to affix postage stamps to stationery when prices were increased.

I have noticed many items of G.B. stationery uprated with stamps, both postcards, reply cards, letter cards, airletters, registered envelopes and envelopes. Since they were on sale like that, should we list them? Is there a full listing of what was uprated in Post Offices, rather than just reflects late use by customers. Yes I know mint can be faked. But some items, presumably RP50 which I've only ever seen with the added postage stamp were only actually issued uprated.
