

CHAIRMAN'S CHAT - AUGUST 2007

The last couple of months have been rather busy philatelically speaking. As well as preparing my exhibit for the International in Saint Petersburg, I have also managed to catch up with a number of members at both Swinpex and Midpex.

This issue's interesting item comes from my collection of the Orange River Colony. It is an item which I acquired recently via an internet auction site for less than \$5. At first sight, the item appears to be a rather ordinary looking ORC postal card. The reality is however somewhat different.

Following the formation of the Union of South Africa on the 31st May 1910, the stamps and stationery of the constituent colonies (Cape, Natal, Transvaal and ORC) became available for use throughout the Union. Perhaps this card is one of the so called Interprovincials, since it is was used in Port Elizabeth, Cape Province? Well actually no, it is not an Interprovincial!

Since 1908, the Government Printer in Pretoria had been printing postal cards and wrappers from the Transvaal plates originally prepared by De La Rue in London. Initially, these were purely for use in the Transvaal, but after Union they could be used across South Africa. By 1911 these plates were coming to the end of their life. With no immediate prospect of Union Stationery, the plates used by De La Rue to print ORC (H&G 35) and Natal (H&G 10) postal cards were dispatched from London to South Africa, in order to print a provisional issue for the Union. Of the plates supplied, only the $\frac{1}{2}$ d single card plates were actually used. The plates were reconstituted as the cards printed in Pretoria are much larger in size (140mm x 90mm).

The first cards to be printed were those using the ORC plates (H&G 40), followed by Natal (H&G 14). Leon de Raay, Robson Lowe and Higgins and Gage all give the date of issue as 1912, and the cards became known as the 1912 Pretoria Printings. Subsequently, an 'ORC' card dated 21 December 1911 was discovered. My card is however dated the 16 December 1911, which makes it the earliest known use of Union Postal Stationery

SECRETARY'S NOTES – AUGUST 2007

SWINPEX REPORT

Swinpex 2007 was another rewarding day out for our members who were able to make it to this event. The venue was a brand new school building, close to the old site, but much, much better. All the rooms are light and airy. The new building has a massive atrium that easily housed all 40+ dealers, with classrooms leading off to one side that were used by the specialist societies for meetings during the day, our society included. The society displays and Wiltshire Federation competition entries were in the adjacent main hall, another massive room ideal for the purpose. Catering facilities were provided by Swindon PS members using the new school canteen, and what an excellent job they did of it.

The society meeting was held from 2.00 to 4.00pm with 9 members attending, a little less than last year. As always the meeting was run on a very informal basis. Neil Sargent started off the displays with British STO envelopes issued in KEVII's reign. These started from the humble ½d, with covers prepared by Victor Marsh and included a whole sheet of his specially printed 1d stamps. This is to be Neil's Swipex entry later this year. Neil also showed mint KGV and KGV1 newspaper wrappers prepared for WH Smith, which provoked a discussion on how they were released onto the philatelic market.

Eric Holmes next showed British postal stationery used in Gibraltar, some of the items that he displayed being the only known copy. He included a couple of QV penny pink envelopes sent abroad which were underpaid and surcharged.

George King did his usual trick of bringing a large number of sheets (far more than the 32 allowed – but we were all happy to see these as they are always of interest and George gives only a short talk). He showed British postal stationery overprinted for use in post offices overseas. All the countries using overprinted stationery were on display, except for British Levant and Morocco Agencies.

Arthur Roberts showed modern envelopes and explained why the C5 size was no longer sold, a casualty of the new Pricing in Proportion system.

Colin Baker followed this with British postcards from the KGV period, including both Post Office and STO issues, including a variety of private reply cards.

Mike Smith finally broke the GB mould by showing Orange River Colony issued in the KEVII period, with specimens, essays, proofs, uprated items, wrappers, envelopes and so on.

If you missed Swinpex this year, do try to make it next year on Saturday 14th June 2008. You won't be disappointed with the event or the society's meeting. Make a note on your calendar now.

TONY CHILTON COMPETITION

ASSOCIATION OF BRITISH PHILATELIC SOCIETIES (ABPS)

At the AGM held at Midpex on 30^{th} June this year, the ABPS agreed that the per capita fee for every UK member of a society belonging to the ABPS would be raised from 60p to £1 a year. On the face of it, this seems to be quite an increase. But when the ABPS was set up in 1994 the fee was set at 50p per annum and there has only been one rise to 60p since then.

The ABPS is an important element of philately in the UK and it does much work behind the scenes that many people are either unaware of or have little idea of what is carried out. For example, it publishes the ABPS News every three months and sends out newsletters by email, giving information to societies on matters that will affect them and their members. It also publishes a Handbook and Directory, invaluable to society secretaries, as well as a list of speakers willing to give talks to other societies, without which it would be much more difficult for secretaries to arrange society programmes. The ABPS also organises, or assists with, regional and national events. For example, the frames at Midpex were lent by the ABPS, who also organised their erection and dismantling, enabling our society to show off our publications and to put up interesting displays in a secure manner. It also organises some of the national and international events held in Britain, including the competitions that some of you enjoy entering.

There are plenty of other examples of how the ABPS helps its member societies and philately in general, but I hope that this note helps to explain why we should continue to be members of the ABPS and why it is important that the ABPS remains financially viable.

SOCIETY'S ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING AND 'LIVE' AUCTION

As members have been told previously, the British Philatelic Trust headquarters at 107 Charterhouse Street, London was sold earlier this year and so our meeting in March was the last one we were able to hold there. Our meetings in future will be held at the Royal Philatelic Society's premises at 41 Devonshire Place, London W1G 6JY and will be to a similar format as before. We will still be able to hold our annual competition for the Tony Chilton trophy, and to run an auction in the afternoon. As usual this will be open to room bidders and postal bidders alike.

An information sheet on the meeting is enclosed with this Journal and members are asked to complete the competition slip if they intend submitting an entry.







Rhodesian Study Circle Handbook - Memoir 8; THE POSTAL STATIONERY OF THE BRITISH SOUTH **AFRICA** COMPANY 1890-1924 by Cliff Wheatley & Keith Hanman, with chapters by Colin Hoffman, Ian Johnstone and Robson Lowe, edited by Alan Drysdall; 66pp. available from the Rhodesian Study Circle Publications Officer, 24, Gomshall Road, Cheam, Surrey SM2 7JZ price £10 inclusive of inland/surface postage.

The present work is a further part of the Rhodesian Study Circle Handbook of the Stamps, Postal History and Philately of the Rhodesias and Nyasaland, Zimbabwe, Zambia and Malawi. As the title indicates it presents the currently available information relating to the postal stationery produced for the British South Africa Company. The authors and other contributors are to be commended firstly for the detail provided, secondly for the clarity of its presentation and thirdly on the inclusion of a comprehensive bibliography which enables the source of the information and the statements made, to be readily identified.

Commencing with sections on 'postage rates', the production of postal stationery and 'specimens', the different types of issued postal stationery are then described in considerable detail, with each item being illustrated in colour or black and white. Additional information is also included, such as numbers ordered/delivered, postal notices, provenance including auction details of individual items, and in the case of the Pictorial postcards a summary of the known usage.

An area of particular complexity is the registration envelopes and the variations in the setting of the text and the stamps are given in very considerable detail. There are a number of problems in attempting to assign particular settings of these envelopes to specific

printings or issue dates/deliveries and this section still remains 'work in progress'. Hopefully the information given will stimulate further analysis.

The general listing concludes with wrappers and includes an illustration of the rarely seen 1/2d Admiral issue. The Appendix which forms the final section of this excellent publication comprises a checklist of the issued items together with comments on their relative scarcity. In summary this work represents a significant addition to the postal stationery literature and is very good value for money.

SOME NINETEENTH CENTURY PREDECESSORS OF THE 'VIEW CARDS' John Barker

We are all familiar with the 'View Cards' or Bildpostkarten issued by many countries, particularly in Europe, which proliferated during the 1920's and 1930's and continue to be issued up to the present day. As is consistent with the nature of postal cards, view cards tend to conform to a basic format. The earlier ones having the view in the upper left of the address side of the card measuring typically 60mm x 25-30mm and the later ones

Although this standardised pattern of 'View Card' did not come into being until the 1920's, views appeared on postal cards soon after their introduction, but the views were unofficial and added to the regular post office cards either by hand illustration, or by additional printing. Later on, when regulations allowed, views were sometimes incorporated by sticking photographs onto the cards.

(mid to late 1930's) with a panel occupying the entire left half of the address side of the card with a view in the order of 60-70mm x 50-80mm. Often there were many series of view cards issued over a period of time with many cards in each series. The format of the cards issued often remained basically the same into the 1960's and 70's when monochrome views were phased out and full colour views introduced.


On some "Stamped To Order" postal cards views may be printed on one side or the other, in line with the regulations which applied in the country of issue at the time.

Leaving aside post office issue cards with additional private printing and stamped to order cards, and focussing solely on those issued by the post office, we can trace the incorporation of views into the design of postal cards. One of the earliest postal stationery items, the G.B. Mulready issued in 1840, was an 'illustrated' item but this could hardly be referred to as a 'view'. The Wells Fargo frank used from 1885 to 1907 on Mexican postal stationery envelopes contains a 'view' of a train on an elevated railroad, an ocean scene and an assortment of freight. However this is perhaps only one up from the Mulready type of illustration.




Perhaps the first claim of a dedicated 'view' on a card goes to Bavaria. In 1882 Bavaria issued a postal card to commemorate the Nürnberg Industrial Exhibition. This card had a view of the exhibition hall on the address side of Some early postal cards had ornate borders and headings such as the first Belgium postal cards of 1871. However these did not incorporate 'views' whereas many of the postal cards issued in the 1880s and 1890s for Central American Countries such as Guatemala, Nicaragua and Salvador, especially those printed by the Hamilton Bank Note Company (Seebecks), carried elaborate and ornate headings and borders or underprinting with specific 'views'.





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

A series of cards issued by Hungary for the country's Millennium in 1896 had multicoloured views on the backs of the cards, the address side of these cards is the same as the definitive cards except for the presence of '96' in the lower left hand corner. 30 different

views were printed on the inland rate (2f) cards and 30 on the international rate (5f) cards. In addition a further 2 inland rate cards were issued for Croatia with the heading on the address side in both languages.

A series of lettercards issued by Argentina in 1897 carried monochrome vignette views on their backs. 53 different views are known on the 4c lettercard in either brownish black or bluish black. The 3c lettercard is known with 6 different views. In 1897 a series of postal cards was issued, 3c, 4c, 6c and a reply paid postal card 6c + 6c. 10







Also in 1897 a 1d dark green postal card was issued with 9 different vignette monochrome views in the lower left hand corner of the address side.

Cape of Good Hope issued 1d red postal cards in 1898 with 6 different slate grey monochrome vignette views in the lower left of the address side of the cards.

Also in 1898 Queensland issued 1d chocolate brown postal cards with about 40 different larger sized monochrome views on the left of the address side.

By the turn of the Century the concept of a 'view card' was well developed. Yet it was more than 20 years before they were issued on a regular basis.

A TALE OF TWO WRAPPERS

I was lucky enough to buy a couple of rather nice newspaper wrappers recently, both from the Victorian period and each interesting in their own way. But before I get to describe them, we ought to remind ourselves of the history of newspaper wrappers.

For many years newspapers had been taxed as a source of income for the Government. There was growing unrest at the imposition of this duty, which many considered to be a tax on knowledge. In 1836 a minor concession was given when newspapers that were taxed were allowed the privilege of free postage. In 1855 the compulsory taxing of newspapers was abandoned, but the option remained for newspapers to continue to be taxed and therefore retain the privilege of passing through the post free of charge. Because only some newspapers were being taxed and others were not, and also because of the large amount of printed matter in the post which could look very much like a newspaper at first glance, the Post Office had to be certain that the duty had been paid. Thus it was made a requirement that the duty stamp that was impressed on the newspaper had to be visible when it passed through the post, otherwise the newspaper would almost certainly be surcharged as having been posted unpaid. A narrow band of paper was ideal for this purpose as it tied the newspaper in a neat roll, gave space for the address, but allowed the duty stamp to be seen.

In 1870 the newspaper duty ceased and the $\frac{1}{2}$ d newspaper post came into being. The Post Office introduced $\frac{1}{2}$ d wrappers specifically for this purpose with a new design for a $\frac{1}{2}$ d stamp that was much taller than normal to give more chance of it being cancelled by sorting office workers, particularly if the wrapper was around a tight roll of paper.


From 1855 it had been possible to have newspaper wrappers impressed with embossed stationery stamps so that they could be used for printed matter or newspapers that did not carry the newspaper duty stamp. Although they are not that common, examples do exist. From 1872 the green ½d stamp used for Post Office wrappers could also be impressed on private wrappers. Few companies took advantage of this and it is extremely difficult to find examples of STO wrappers bearing the green ½d stamp, although it is much easier to find Post Office wrappers which have been privately overprinted. Following the change of colour of the newspaper wrapper stamp from green to brown in 1879 many more wrappers were printed to order, a facility that remained popular until the withdrawal of the STO facility in 1973.

The first of my two wrappers that I mentioned at the beginning of this article is a stamped to order item impressed with the 1/2d green stamp. It is far larger than its Post Office counterpart, and was originally 9" wide by 111/2" long, although it has been slightly reduced in width. It was produced using a similar thin, white paper to that used for Post Office wrappers. The wrapper is cancelled on the front with a W over 38 single obliterator for Kensington, but no date is given. Although there are no date stamps on the wrapper or indicator of who had these printed, I believe that it was used in 1875. It has a manuscript endorsement on the reverse which reads "From Haig the Wine Merchants of Argyll St, Oxford Circus. City office 19 Mark Lane EC - Friday 20 snb 9am 14 May 1875". I have not been able to find out what "20 snb" stands for, but the 14 May was a Friday.

It was a common practice in the Victorian period to make manuscript notes on envelopes and postcards (sometimes referred to as "filing notes"), although similar notes on newspaper wrappers are rarely seen. The note on this wrapper is intriguing, but I doubt that we will ever know exactly what it refers to.

The second of my two newspaper wrappers is unusual in that it is an 1889 Post Office issue with a brown newspaper stamp on buff paper that has been printed with an advertisement on the inside. Unlike lettersheets that appeared from 1840, which the public would have opened carefully, newspaper wrappers were generally cut, or more likely, torn from the rolled paper and discarded. It would have been the newspaper and not the wrapper that people would have wanted to read. This is the only example of a newspaper wrapper that I have seen printed on the inside. Is this item unique or are there other wrappers similarly printed with advertisements? That this example has survived intact is amazing.

George Scott & Son was a small firm of builders in Newcastleon-Tyne, with premises at Douglas Terrace, but as far as I can establish that are no longer in business.

If any reader can provide any further information on either of the two wrappers described in this article then I would be very pleased to hear from them.

PEFINS THROUGH POSTAL STATIONERY ITEMS: Newspaper Wrappers – Part 2

As with the previous articles in this series, the information has been provided by **Rosemary Smith** who has conducted research with the aid of members of the Perfin Society and published her findings in the Perfin Society Bulletins.

Through these articles I not only wish to inform members of the use of perfins on (G.B.) postal stationery, but to seek help in identifying more precisely which items of stationery have had perfins through their stamp impressions. If any member can add to the information given in these articles I would be most obliged to hear from them. All such information will be acknowledged and will be shared with Rosemary Smith and the Perfin Society. For any newspaper wrapper which has a perfin listed in the tables please let me know:

1) if you can identify the Huggins number of the postal stationery item

- 2) if you can identify the user where no identification is given
- 3) if the item is postmarked earlier or later than the range given

This information will help to fill in the gaps in these tables.

For items which have a perfin which is **not** given in the list please identify the postal stationery item as far as possible with its Huggins number, identification of the user if this is printed or embossed on the item, the date and place of use (if used) and a photocopy or scan showing the holes of the perfin. These details are needed to help cataloguers identify the perfin.







The day was busy right from start to finish with some dealers reluctant to pack away at the end of the day.



REPLY - Season Ticket Application Newspaper Wrapper

Surprisingly, I have not had any response to this query although I have seen similar wrappers and must assume that other members may have examples of these in their collections. Illustrated below is a KE VII $\frac{1}{2}$ d yellow-green on straw coloured paper measuring 124mm x 296mm. The two corners of the gummed end are cut off similar to Huggins WP21.



The postmark is LONDON. N / AUG 19 07 /4. 15 PM

Both PeterO'Keeffe's wrapper and the one above appear to have been posted from London N. Offices and both are addressed to residents in the local area: - Peter's wrapper to Wilberforce Road (London N 4) and mine to Haringay Park (N 8). As these are close to Highbury, the home of Arsenal Football Club, could they be applications for a season ticket for Arsenal Football Club?, particularly as the dates of posting are both towards the start of the football season. Perhaps not as 'Woolwich Arsenal', as this team were formerly known did not move to the Highbury site until 1913! This leaves the possibility that the Season Ticket Applications were for Tottenham Hotspur Football Club who had moved, in 1899, to the site of a disused nursery behind a pub on land belonging to the Brewers 'Charringtons', now the 'White Hart Lane' ground. Can any 'Spurs' supporters throw some light on this theory, or can any members report other similar wrappers with details of posting and addressees?

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
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
