## CHAIRMAN'S CHAT - MAY 2008

Along with a number of other PSS members, I attended the 'Exhibiting and Judging Postal Stationery at International Level' seminar led by Alan Huggins and held at the Royal Philatelic Society in London on the 15 April. The morning covered the FIP special regulations and guidelines, the definition and nature of postal stationery and the principles of exhibit composition. The afternoon covered the requirements of the 'Introductory Sheet' and judging criteria. This was an excellent event and if repeated, I would recommend it to anyone considering exhibiting or judging at International level.

I am also planning to attend the regional meeting at SWINPEX in Swindon on the 14 June. This is always an
excellent event and I look forward to meeting as many members as possible.

Yet again, this issue's interesting item comes from my collection of Orange Free State Postal Stationery:

The postal card in question comes from the period of the British Occupation of the O.F.S. in early 1900. At this time, the current OFS cards were overprinted 'V.R.I.' (Victoria Regina Imperatrix) - this included the De La Rue printed cards, together with a small number of locally printed threehalfpence cards. The particular 'V.R.I.' overprint is from the second setting with a thin ' $V$ ' and raised stops.


The card is one of the threehalfpence cards originally printed by Borckenhagen in Bloemfontein in 1897. It is the sixth type which had the ' $d$ ' after ' $11 / 2$ ' inserted by hand in a
separate operation. The card is of particular interest as it is the only recorded example which has the ' $d$ ' missing.

This is going to be another interesting regional meeting - very informal but also very friendly. If you don't attend any other meetings this year, make this one of your days out for 2008.

## MEETING REPORT - Spring 2008

Twelve members managed to attend the society's first meeting of the year, chaired by Mike Smith, and beld at the Royal Philatelic Society's headquarters in London. This despite the signalling failures on the railways, football crowds and the threat of bad weather. Apologies were received from Ed Caesley, John Barker, Graham Barker and Jobn Fowler. Keith Hanman also gave his apologies after the meeting, having also been thwarted by the signalling failure at Waterloo:

Alan Huggins said that the response to the new catalogue 'Collect British Postal Stationery' had been very positive and that quite a few new items had come to light as a result of a number of people checking their collections. It was intended that notice of these would be included in the two societies Journals (GBPS and PSS) and an addendum sheet would be issued. Mike Smith suggested that it also be put on the society's website.

Neil Sargent told members that if anyone had lots for the next auction they should be given to him as soon as possible.

The morning display was given by Peter Rolfe on the stationery of Sierra Leone. He explained that much research bad been carried out on the pre-independence issues (up to 1961), but little had been done on those issues that followed. Much of what he showed in the post independence period was as a result of his own research. Peter included a full range of stationery from the Queen Victoria issues right up to the present day. He showed a mixture of mint, used and specimen stationery, explaining
how some issues of the QV registration envelopes had been printed in varying shades of blue. Members noted this had occurred with the stationery of some other Empire countries, speculating on how and why this had happened. Peter told us some of the stationery items were very difficult to find used, particularly the inland postcards, despite the relatively high numbers issued.

Peter had many frames of air letters for us to see, with various rate and printing changes, different settings and flap shapes. Inflation in the country over the last few years had been exceptionally high, resulting in some of the modern stationery and air letters appearing to be highly expensive, although in reality they were not.

Peter finished the display with newspaper wrappers and international reply coupons.

Mike Smith thanked Peter for an excellent and enjoyable display which had been well presented.

The Society's Single Sheet Competition was judged after lunch by all those present. The winner was Neil Sargent (for the second year running) for his one sheet entry on 'The Introduction of the Postcard 1870'. Mike Smith presented him with the Society cup.

Three other entries with equal marks came joint second - George King 'QV Overtime Reports', Colin Baker 'KGV Field Service Card' and John Norton 'The Marsh Brothers'. There were four other entries all submitted by George King.

Members' displays were kicked off by Neil Sargent who showed GB King Edward VII stamped to order issues. He included values from $1 / 2$ d to $1 /$-, proofs and envelopes with two and three values applied to make up specific postal rates. Neil also included a half sheet of embossed stamps prepared by H Edgar Weston.

John Norton continued to entertain everyone with items from the 1890 Penny Post Jubilee celebrations, including the special insert card printed with advertising material for an insurance company, which had not been seen before. He also showed GB stationery overprinted for use in certain African countries - Bechuanaland, Cyprus, Niger Coast, Zululand and Somalia.

George King put up sheets of envelopes for use in Ireland, showing how these had started with embossed stamps and had progressed to rather strange letterpress designs. He also showed the variety of printings used to line these envelopes.

Colin Baker gave a display showing how postal stationery cut-outs had been used to pay postage. He included commercial covers, as well as a number of philatelic items produced by Edgar Weston in the first half of the $20^{\text {th }}$ century.

John Ray displayed the postal stationery of Fiji from the beginning up to the present day. He showed hand drawn essays for the QV registration envelopes and proofs in blue.

Alan Huggins continued with GB postal stationery overprinted for use in Bechuanaland. He showed the emtor of the omission of the overprint on the 4 d registration envelope, plus mint, used and specimen stationery. Alan also included some Cape of Good Hope postcards overprinted and used in Bechuanaland.

Tony Lane finished off the afternoon with German Tourist Cards from 1925. He included many of the vignettes printed on these cards showing how they had become larger over time. Quite of few of the cards were used, and some had been carried on Zeppelin airships.

Mike Smith said he appreciated the effort everyone had made to come to the meeting. He was pleased to see a couple of new faces and thanked all those who had displayed.

Some of you will know the name Andrew Whitworth (one of our long standing members) from the advertisements he has placed in our Journal, you may have bought from him and may even know him personally. Andrew has recently suffered a couple of minor strokes and is no longer able to trade. However I am pleased to say that he is still taking a keen interest in postal stationery and I am sure we all wish him a speedy recovery.

It was pleasing to see George King at the Spring Meeting. George is also recovering from a serious illness, but is determined not to let go of his postal stationery collecting. Our good wishes for a speedy recovery also go out to him.

There had been significant public pressure to introduce a cheaper form of posiage than the ld raiz. The postcard was first used in Austria a year earlier. The Post Office decided to introduce a special rate of $1 / 2 d$ for printed material using wrappers and short messages using the new postcards. Initiolly only pre-paid Post Office issues could be sent at this reduced rate. Their popularity has never waned!

## EVOLUTION OF THE EARLY GERMAN VIEW CARDS

Following the revaluation of the German Mark on $1^{\text {st }}$ December 1924 the postal rates for postcards were fixed at 5Pf. for inland transmission and 20Pf. for foreign destinations. It was once again feasible to issue prepaid postal stationery without the need for constant up-rating to cope with high inflation. The first issue was of standard sized cards ( $140 \mathrm{~mm} . \times 90 \mathrm{~mm}$.) bearing the imprinted design of a stylised eagle as used for the adhesive stamps.

At the U.P.U. Congress held in Stockholm in 1924, an agreement was made to set the limit of the dimensions for postcards for the international service at 150 mm . x 105 mm . (DIN A6 size). It was also suggested that member states should set the same limits for inland postcards. New larger postal cards conforming to these dimensions were issued by the Reichspost for the inland rate in 1925 but it was not until 1926 that they were issued for the international rate. By this time the foreign rate for
postcards had been reduced to 15Pf. and the definitive stamps and designs for postal stationery had changed to a new series of 'Famous Germans'.

However, before the new regulations were implemented, two commemorative cards were issued in 1925 in the old smaller format, one for the Rheinland Millennium and the other for the German Trade Exhibition in Munich. The former card was also issued as a series of 6 cards each with a different view in the upper left hand corner. Known as 'Bildpostkarten', these were the first of the German View Cards which were to be issued in many different forms throughout the remainder of the twentieth century.

Although Germany was not the first European country to issue view cards, it was one of the early ones to do so. Switzerland had issued the furst series in 1923 and Netherlands was the second country to issue in 1924.

The cards were surface printed at the State printing Works, Berlin in green on pale buff cardstock. They were valid for use until $31^{\text {st }}$ January 1928.

The six views are:

1. The ruins at Badenweiler
2. Indoor swimming baths at Breslau
3. Frankfurt am Main
4. Sanatorium at Bad Flinsberg
5. Bad Salzschlirf
6. North Sea Health Resort Borkum

The views featured in this first series were not specifically related to the subject of the commemorative card, i.e. they were not all located in the Rheinland. The numbers issued varied from 20,000 to 100,000 . It is interesting to note that even in the 1960's 70's, and 80's when the issue of view cards was quite prolific, most individual cards were only produced in similar quantities.

Apart from this first issue, all future series of view cards were in the new A6 size ( 148 mm . $\times 105 \mathrm{~mm}$.) format and bore imprinted stamps of the contemporary definitive series.

The publicity section of the Reichspost offered any city or town council the opportunity to order these cards with their own choice of view and the option to determine which regions of the country their cards would be sold in. For the early series of view cards the views were taken from drawings, but from 1931 photographic reproductions were used. A minimum order of 50,000 cards was established with the sponsoring authority paying 0.5 Pf . per card. There were no announcements as to where individual views could be purchased; consequently it was difficult for collectors to compile complete sets of these early cards. However from the end of October 1930 complete series of view cards could be obtained from the philatelic counters of Berlin 2
and Munich 2 Post Offices.
The second series of view cards was issued on $17^{\text {th }}$ February 1926. The imprinted stamp was the 'Stylised Eagle' design which had been used for the definitive issues
of 1924. There were 26 different views in this series including 10 different views of Frankfurt am Main and 4 of Wiesbaden.

The third series of view cards issued in 1927 carried the imprinted stamp of Schiller from the 'Famous Germans' designs which had been introduced for the definitive postalcards in the previous year. The address panel included instructions for filling in the last two lines to encourage the sender to conform to a standard format in order to make sorting easier. This change in the address panel was present not only on the 'Famous Germans'
postalcards but had been introduced even earlier in 1926 for the last issue of the definitive 'Stylised Eagle' postalcards.

The inland postcard rate was increased to 8 pf on $1^{\text {st }}$ August 1927. The 8Pf. imprinted stamp of the 'Famous Germans' was that of Beethoven and so it appeared on the fourth series of view cards issued in 1927. This series contained 27 different views.

In 1928 the 'Famous Germans' designs for the definitive stamps were superseded by the 'Reich Presidents' designs; the 8Pf showing President Friedrich Ebert. As with previous issues, the view cards had the same formatting as their contemporary definitive postalcards. Thus the fifth series of view cards incorporated the same features as the definitive postalcards: two dotted lines at the bottom of the left hand panel together with four lines of text for the sender's name and address.

In a period of four years between 1925 and 1928 Germany had issued five series of view cards. The number of cards issued in each series varied from 6 to 27 depending on the number of orders placed by Town Councils etc. Little if anything had evolved in terms of the actual view and its presentation. What had evolved during these early years was related to the changes made to the inland postalcards in general. The forces bringing about the
changes were first of all the U.P.U. regulations of 1924 relating to the size of postcards and then the Reichspost's decisions to make it easier for postal workers to sort the mail not only for delivery but also for the return of undelivered items.

In the same four years other European countries had initiated series of view cards: Austria (1927), Czechoslovakia, Luxembourg and Romania (1928) Liechtenstein and the Soviet Union (1929). Collectors of these areas will no doubt see changes in the view cards issued by these countries over time. The changes occurring in the evolution of any of these countries's view cards may be for similar reasons to those which occurred in Germany.

In future articles I will look at the years that follow and the changes which took place as the view cards of Germany 'matured'.

## BATH POSTAL MUSEUM RECEIVES A NATIONAL COMMENDATION FROM THE ASSOCIATION FOR HERITAGE INTERPRETATION

Bath Postal Museum has won a major award for the outstanding way it communicates with its visitors. The Interpret Britain and Ireland Commendation was presented to Colin Baker \& Ivan Holliday by popular Irish actor Frank Kelly in Ireland on 26 November.

The awards recognise the very best examples of interpretation - the art of helping people explore and appreciate our world. Winners had to score high marks against a range of rigorous criteria including imagination and innovation, good interpretive planning and a clear commitment to accessibility, training and maintenance.

The Bath Postal Museum applied for an award from the Association of Heritage Interpretation following its move to new premises last year. This modern museum is now located beneath the main post office in Bath where new displays and exhibits give visitors an insight into the
importance that communications have had in the development of this country. Three important Bath men come to life on 'Talking Heads' screens with John Palmer, Ralph Allen and Thomas Moore Musgrave telling visitors how they influenced the post some 200 years ago. Other postal characters tell their stories of life in the Post Office in bygone days. There are also plenty of other interactive displays for visitors to enjoy. Visiting AHI judges commented: "We wish to recommend a commendation for this site, based on the attractive use of media, layering of interpretation, lots of interactivity with specific opportunities for families and children. Specific exhibits worked well, particularly, the talking heads and there was a good variety of exhibit types".

Audrey Swindells, one of the museum's founders, said "how thrilled everyone is at receiving this award. A large number of people have worked very hard over a number of years to ensure the continued success of the museum. This award is a fitting tribute to all their labours".

The permanent displays are always worth a visit. In addition our colourful and frequently changing exhibits have something to offer for everyone.

## GB POSTAL STATIONERY NEWS

Alan Huggins

First of all Colin Baker and I would like to say how much we have appreciated the enthusiastic and generous comments made to us personally about 'Collect British Postal Stationery'. We are only too delighted that it has been well received not only by collectors of postal stationery but has also been of considerable interest to those whose primary interests lie elsewhere.

We would like to thank all those members and others who have taken the trouble to point out where our proof reading slipped, although in some cases we would plead software gremlins took a hand during data transfer. All the amendments and new information reported to-date has been assembled and arranged in page order to facilitate integration with the book. This information has also been printed separately for those who may wish to physically keep it with the book.

Any further information will of course be published periodically in this column.

## NEW ISSUES

Although at one point it appeared as if Royal Mail were not going to produce C5 and C4 size envelopes with NVI impressions for business customers these have now appeared in both 1st and 2nd class versions and are listed as EP211- EP214.

Royal Mail have indicated (Philatelic Bulletin Vol. 45 p. 236 2008) that the sender's name and address on
the back of the standard airletter is being repositioned slightly to the right to avoid it being covered by the sealing flap. This occurs on discount (starred) airletters with MSE342/07 print code on flap and similar changes will be made to other versions of airletters when they are next reprinted.

## NEW ITEMS REPORTED

As will be seen from the amendments to 'Collect British Postal Stationery' its publication has stimulated the detailed examination of collections and not surprisingly a number of previously unrecorded or unseen items have surfaced especially in the stamped to order categories. Perbaps the most surprising is the number of new items in the Advertising Ring section where a number of new values for Frank Millar and George Prior are reported for first time, and the first example substantiating the actual usage of the Saunders, Otley \& Co. ring has turned up after nearly 150 years. Coming more up to-date John Fowler has sent in a previously unrecorded STO postcard with an octagonal Machin NVI3a printed in blue with two phosphor bands. This unregulated size card was produced by the Royal Mail Retail Department, 20 Brandon Street Edinburgh in 1994 and because of its colourful appearance one might have expected it to have been kept - apparently not. The other unusual feature is that the NVI impression is only 21 x 21 mm .

Finally, another surprise awaited me when on a recent visit to the Trafalgar Square Post Office I saw a series of prepaid 'PostPaks' on display in the shopping area. On enquiring I was told that these had only been on sale for a week or so and were designed to save people the trouble of queuing up for stamps. I refrained from enlightening my informant that this was not exactly a novel concept having been around nearly 170 years.

PostPaks come in three sizes, C5 for large letters up to 500 g and C4 \& C3 for packets up to 500 g and 1 kg respectively. Printed in red on white plastic with self seal flaps and bubble wrap inside they are priced at $£ 1.89$ for C5, $£ 3.19$ for C4 and $£ 4.59$ for C3. It will be interesting to see whether these become widely available and also whether any Welsh language versions appear.

## BOOK REVIEW

## Neuer Ganzsachen-Katalog:

Africa 2007 Compiled by Norbert Sehler. Published by Berliner Ganzsachen-Sammler-Vereins von 1901, Berlin 2007. 656pp.

This catalogue which is the latest publication produced by the Berliner Ganzsachen-Sammler-Vereins von 1901 continues a long established record of providing collectors with postal stationery catalogues. Compiled by Norbet Sehler with the assistance of Edy Pockele, Dr HansGeorg Meissner, Detlef Hilmer and Christoph Gärtner it provides an update of the seminal Grosser GanzsachenKatalog by Dr Ascher which was published in 1928 having appeared previously in sections. This was reprinted by Karlheinz Erner in 1996 together with a separate pricing update but naturally lacked any listing of material issued since the original edition was published.

This has now been rectified and although the text is in German it is relatively easy to follow and the illustrations have been greatly improved. This is a major work and although there are now a number of specialised listings of various countries now available, this catalogue provides a ready reference for anyone who wants an overview of the range of postal stationery issued by the countries within

Africa and the Indian Ocean. A minor point is that while the issues of Freach Morocco and Spanish Morocco are included those of the British Post Offices are not for no obvious reason. Although fully priced which gives a guide as to relative scarcity of the items listed, in my view the level of pricing is generally very much on the conservative side, I would very much like to be able to fill gaps especially of used twentieth century material at the figures quoted.

Finally I would congratulate all those who have contributed to the creation of this publication which is an important addition to the postal stationery literature.

# HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT OFFICIAL POSTAL STATIONERY AN AMAZING DISCOVERY <br> Alan Huggins 



The area of postal stationery never ceases to surprise and new items still turn up on a fairly regular basis especially in the stamped to order categories. However for a completely unknown item of official Houses of Parliament stationery to surface after 168 years is, to put it mildly, absolutely amazing.

As is well known with the introduction of the uniform penny postal rate for letters up to $1 / 2$ ounce on 10 January 1840 and the simultaneous abolition of the 'Free Franking' privilege for Members of Parliament, special envelopes were produced with the printed inscription 'To be posted at the Houses of Parliament only'. These came into use on the 14 January 1840 being superseded at the end of the month by envelopes separately inscribed 'House of Commons' and 'House of Lords'.

Until now two values of the 'Houses of Parliament' envelopes were known, namely one penny for letters not exceeding $1 / 2 \mathrm{oz}$. in weight and twopence for letters not exceeding 1 oz. Thus I was amazed to be recently shown a piece with the inscription 'Post Paid. -Fourpence.-Weight
not to exceed 20z.' To the best of my knowledge the existence of such an item has never been reported previously or even speculated about.

As can be seen from the illustration the item is a large piece used on 3 April 1840 to Evesham. Printed on unwatermarked wove paper it is $90 \times 175 \mathrm{~mm}$ at its greatest dimensions. Although it is not possible to determine its full original size, it was clearly larger than the 1 d or 2 d envelopes which vary between $90-95 \times 125-140 \mathrm{~mm}$. One possibility which cannot be ruled out is that this item may have been a wrapper rather than an envelope, since the survival rate of wrappers tends to be less than that of envelopes, although the demand for an item prepaying a 4d rate would doubtless be far less than that for the 2 d errvelopes of which only a handful bave survived.

At any rate it joins the 2 d House of Lords envelope as being one of the rarest items of British postal stationery. My thanks are due to Argyll Etkin Limited for bringing this item to my attention and for providing the illustration.
