CHAIRMAN'S CHAT - MAY 2015

In early November 2013 a group of about 20 used Ceylon GV wrappers and one GVI newspaper wrapper appeared on an internet auction. All the items listed were from the latter part of the GV period, the most difficult period for Ceylon wrappers. In the previous 10 years or so only one or two used copies each of different wrappers, from this period, had appeared on the internet auction! This will give readers some indication of their relative scarcity.

Amongst this group of wrappers were two wrappers which have never been listed before by anyone. It took me a while to calm down after seeing all these wrappers being listed at one time, twice as many as I had seen in the previous 10 years or so. So after a period of reflection I decided on what I should bid, entered my snipe bids and waited patiently for the auctions to end. At the end I was very pleased to find that I had won most of the items, including the two new wrappers, and all at relatively reasonable prices.

Once the items were safely in my hand I sent scans of the two new items to several Ceylon postal stationery collectors including Dr Chandra Rodrigo. (Chandra is the author of the most recent catalogue of Ceylon postal stationery, published in 2010.) All the collectors contacted confirmed that they had never seen these particular two items before.

The only disappointing thing about these two items is that they have both been cut down to the size as illustrated.

MEETING REPORT - MARCH 28th 2015

Sixteen members attended the first of our four 2015 meetings. Unfortunately our Chairman, **Jan Kosniowski**, was not able to be with us as he was recovering from an operation performed a few days earlier and had been advised by his surgeon not to travel for a couple of weeks. Our new deputy Chairman, **Maurice Buxton**, stood in for him.

Following this, it was the turn of members present to give their own short displays.

Peter Robinson showed two frames of Vatican air letters 1950 to 1996, some mint and some used. These are not easy to find and Peter had amassed a wonderful collection.

George King followed with two more frames of Penny Pink envelopes with pre-printed addresses. These were sent to clients to pay for their replies, orders for goods, payment of accounts, etc. It was amazing to see so many pre-printed

envelopes collected together.

Maurice Buxton added two more frames showing the changes that occurred to GB registered envelopes from the Victorian period up to the end of the 20th century in respect of fees, postage, compensation limits, etc.

In the final session, **George King** put up three frames of Isle of Mann postcards (1982 - 2004) that had been issued since the IoM postal administration had become independent.

Neil Sargent had three more frames of the postal stationery of Turkey from 1926 to 1983, telling us how difficult it was to get material in the early part of this period.

Tony Lane displayed two frames of German Post Office official commemorative postcards issued in the period 1910 to 1934.

Finally **Keith Hanman** showed four frames of colourful Swiss National Festival Postcards for the period 1910 to 1938.

Maurice Buxton closed the meeting by thanking everyone who had come along to the meeting and to those who had given displays. He wished all a safe journey home.



INDIAN REGISTRATION ENVELOPES: ADVERTISING ENVELOPE

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
The Indian Victorian 2 anna Registration envelopes (in two sizes) issued in May 1886 were not very popular early on. According to Brigadier D.S. Virk in his book 'Indian Postal History 1873-1923':

"A label was issued in 1887 to point out their advantages but apparently even this had little effect. By 1890 the unsold stock remained so large that the Director General devised a special advertisement Envelope with printed Notices on its front and back, which was to be given to the members of the public purchasing stamps. These envelopes remained in use for nearly two years."


The Advertising Envelope he refers to was printed on both sides. Attached are scans of the front and back of the Advertisement Envelope I recently acquired. It should be noted that the reverse is blank. While this is similar in concept to the one described by Brigadier Virk, it is a new type and previously unrecorded.

I have inquired with fellow Indian postal stationery collectors and none have ever seen either the one described by Brigadier Virk or the one I recently acquired.



STATIONERY FORGERIES

For my entry into the Society's single sheet competition at the March meeting, I showed the King George VI 6d postcard forgery. (**Fig. 1**) If you look in the Huggins & Baker catalogue there is reference to it as a footnote in the postcard Stamped to Order section. I acquired mine in an auction lot 3 or 4 years ago -I think from Gartner auctions in Germany. The printing is in

It also reminded me that I acquired some other forgeries a few years ago when visiting the stamp fair in Verona, Italy. These items were being sold by a guy outside the venue from the back of a car in the car park. Seeing a few people looking at material on the way in, I went over in my normally nosy way to see what was going on. He was offering stamps but also a packet of stationery items for, I think, about 5 euros. Clearly these items looked dodgy but I bought them anyway! They comprised 4 cards from Grenada and 1 Gold Coast. The Grenada ones are illustrated here - 2 QV & 2 KEVII. (Fig. 2) The card is quite thick, the printing is very good but obviously they are fakes. Three of the cards have a slightly mottled effect, the best is the KEVII 1/2d but in green!

The question though is – why on earth go to the trouble of faking these cards, which in mint form tend to be common, uncollected and worth only a $\pounds 1$ or $\pounds 2$ at best?? These were the only ones the chap had.

Lastly, I also found somewhere, this lovely QV ¹/₂d postcard in green on cream card for Snark Island (**Fig. 3**). It doesn't appear in H&G and is not one of the outer Scottish Islands. However, it is the name of a website for novels and sketches following on from the stories of Lewis Carroll! All good fun.

The principle of a postal ID document was decided by UPU (Universal Postal Union) in 1885, after a proposal by Italy. Initially it was a booklet with vouchers allowing the holder to perform postal operations in other UPU countries, such as receiving registered mail. At that time, national ID documents were not in common use, so a postal ID document made sense. France issued it's first identity booklet 1 July 1892. Book Review : Canada Postal Stationery Letter Cards of the Victorian Period 1893 – 1899 Colin G. Banfield

In Canadian postal stationery, the small series of Victorian letter cards has been somewhat neglected. This book is a colour reproduction of an exhibit prepared by Colin Banfield, a Past-President of the Canadian Philatelic Society of Great Britain. In August 2014, at BNAPEX 2014 BALPEX in Baltimore, U.S.A., this exhibit was awarded both BNAPEX and BALPEX Gold.

The cards produced by the British American Bank Note Company and by the American Bank Note Company are shown, as are the different printing settings and perforation varieties. However, the main focus of the exhibit is on the rates for which letter cards were issued, and how the cards were actually used.

In addition to cards used for their intended purpose without any added adhesives, copies of the 1^{ϕ} and 2^{ϕ} cards uprated with stamps for proper domestic use are shown, as well as a copy of a 3^{ϕ} card that was registered and one sent by special delivery. A good selection of cards revalued from 3ϕ to 2ϕ in 1899 is presented. However, the particular beauty of the exhibit lies in the cards uprated for mailing to overseas addresses. Among these are letter cards sent to destinations outside North America, the United Kingdom and Europe - Guatemala, Argentina, Turkey, South Africa, Hong Kong and Grand Turk (Island).

The exhibit pages are shown as they appeared in the frames, full-size, and the colour reproduction in the book is very good, something that is difficult to achieve with such items. The order of presentation in the exhibit is a bit awkward in places. For example, the page showing copies of British American Bank Note Company 2ϕ cards with the first heading setting follows several pages devoted to 2ϕ cards with the second heading setting. Also, because it is an "exhibit book", there is limited text and few references. Furthermore, there is no discussion of the several papers used for the American Bank Note cards. Nevertheless, this is an essential handbook for the collector of Canadian letter cards and should also prove useful to those who collect Canadian postal history of the period.

Details of the project leading to the publication of these two books and what is covered by each book are well laid out in the publisher's brief on the opposite page.

The two works are a testament to the collaboration between dedicated groups of collectors who recognising the need for comprehensive reference books set about rewriting and re-checking what was already known, combining this with new discoveries and exploring archival material. The analytical eye of Dr John Gledhill combined with his skills of composition have ensured that each work is clearly and carefully structured. This makes it not only easy for readers to use, but compels the reader to want to dig deeper into the associated areas.

These books are sturdy case bound volumes printed in the UK by Alford Printing Services, hence their quality is assured. As reference works they are designed to be used and should not succumb to constant thumbing through.

Overprinted British Postal Stationery

Each chapter is preceded with an enumerated list of contents, tables and figures to make for the easy location of a particular item. The General Introduction gives a wealth of vital background information to the nature of the basic items which were 'overprinted'. Each territory is assigned a separate chapter and has its own introductory section dealing with the postal context for that territory, important for an understanding of the stationery issues which were overprinted. Each type of stationery item (postcard, newspaper wrapper etc) has its own subsection with illustrations and tables. References specific to each chapter are given at the end of that particular chapter.

The appendices provide useful summaries, cross references, identification guides and indications of relative scarcity.

Overprinted British Airletters

Although having many features in common with the Postal Stationery Book, the chapters following the four introductory ones are each based on a particular airletter type eg. 1952 King George VI issue, 1953 Queen Elizabeth Coronation issue etc. This makes for easy searching as many overprints are of currency only. Comprehensive tables give measurements of the overprints, Jones numbers and 'earliest known dates' and cross reference to the profusion of illustrations. All this makes identification relatively easy. A chapter is devoted to Specimen and essay overprints and provision cards held in the British Postal Museum and Archive.

As with the Overprinted Postal Stationery Book, British Airletters has an appendix listing the scarcity ratings; in this instance for the 'Gulf' Airletters. A table 'Identity Checklist' makes for quick and easy identification. The comprehensive tables of deliveries and sales make for interesting reading.

The project for these books started in 2011, and was initiated by a generous donation from a former member of the society. Both books have been compiled from primary sources and are not just updates to existing publications. The sources were actual items or good scans/photocopies of actual items. Nothing that was included in previous publications was taken as automatically accurate, and in fact several "ghosts" have been identified in them. Over 40 members of GBOS and related societies kindly contributed many hundreds of images for the research into postal stationery, and in some cases also cast an expert eye over the relevant draft chapters. And over a dozen submitted airletters or images for the Airletters book, and also cast an expert eye over the draft book. The overall books have been edited by John Gledhill, to ensure a consistent approach throughout the veritable maze of issues. Both books are profusely illustrated in colour, with all types and listed variants illustrated. The tables in both books are designed to be of use to the specialist and general collector alike: both include an appendix with a simplified listing for the "highlevel" collector/dealer. The books are not "catalogues" in the sense of giving detailed valuations for each item, but (following suggestions from dealers) both include an appendix of indicative scarcity ratings to assist dealers and collectors alike (the GBOS is grateful to comments from some dealers on the ratings).

The Airletters book traces the development of British airletter design from the first overprinted issues to the final issues in the 1960s, and, with the help of archive material, explains why the later issues had the "wrong stamp" on them, continuing on special printings with the

Queen's head when Britain had changed to the parliament design. Several new types came to light during the research, extending the previous findings of Terry Jones's catalogue. In fact only 2 months before the book was due to go to press a totally new airletter design was found with the "Value-Only" overprint, right at the end of the period; this is a major new find, and to date only 3 copies are known, all used as part of the same business correspondence. Archive material also includes essays, official correspondence and provision cards. 122 pages.

The Postal Stationery book covers all types of postal stationery other than airletters. The scope of the definition as laid down by the FIP comprises the main types known to most collectors, but also includes (for example) postal orders, telegraph forms, reply coupons, and a brief survey of the huge topic of overprinted stationery packet bands, and overprinted amendments to UK postal material. Remarkable archive material is included for the first time, including official plans for overprinted registration envelopes for the Gulf, airletters for Eritrea and others. The only previous source for overprinted British postal stationery was the Higgins & Gage series; this is now extremely out of date, having been first compiled over 50 years ago, and which contains a number of omissions, and ghosts or misleading entries which have now been clarified in this book. The book cannot claim, however, to include all the details covered in specialist societies' journals and books, otherwise the GBOS book would be twice the current size. But the detail is certainly sufficient for most collectors, with crossreferences to more specialist material where necessary. 504 pages.

THE FIRST RECORDED COMMERCIAL STAMPED TO ORDER AIR MAIL LETTER SHEET WITH A KING GEORGE V EMBOSSED DIE

Having already sent off the copy for the Postal Stationery News for this issue to the John Barker I then received, courtesy of **Stephen Schumann**, news of an amazing new discovery. Previously the only suggestion that commercial usage of STO air mail letter sheets existed had been the possible usage by an unidentified bank of the 6d King George VI die. This led Andrew Whitworth in 1957, to create a number of variants using this KGVI value and also various QEII dies which were concurrently available and these were listed in detail in Kessler's Catalogue of Aerograms (1961). To-date no examples of the rumoured commercial KGVI STO item appear to have surfaced, so it was a great surprise to see the item submitted by **Stephen Schumann** which has the 6d King George V die which was used by Raleigh Industries in August 1951.

This is a further example of the carry over of the use of 3d, 4d and 6d KGV embossed postal stationery dies into the reign of King George VI. The most outstanding is of course the use of the KGV 4d die in blue instead of grey green in 1950, as a result of the colour of the corresponding adhesive stamp being changed, and there being no 4d KGVI die available until April 1951.

N.B. Although the KGVI 6d, 9d and 1s dies were available from 1939-40 and had been used on telegraph forms, they appear not to have been used on STO postal stationery items before 1951.
